

Be Safe, Walk Smart

As we start the new year, let's keep safety in mind for everyone who enjoys walking in our community! While we don't have sidewalks or crosswalks, we do have wide streets—making it even more important to follow these tips:

10 Walking Safety Tips

1. Be predictable. Follow general road safety guidelines and signal your intentions when necessary.
2. Walk facing traffic and stay as far to the side of the road as possible.
3. Always stay alert; avoid distractions like phones or headphones that can take your

eyes and ears off the road.

4. Cross streets with caution. Choose well-lit areas and ensure there's enough time to cross safely.

5. Don't assume drivers see you. Make eye contact when possible to ensure you're noticed.

6. Stay visible. Wear bright clothing during the day and reflective materials or carry a flashlight at night.

7. Watch for vehicles entering or exiting driveways and be cautious near parked cars.

8. Walk in groups if possible. It makes everyone more visible to drivers.

9. Teach kids the importance of road awareness, especially since we don't have sidewalks.

10. Avoid alcohol or substances that may impair your judgment while walking.



Member Spotlight

Meet Ed Reyes

Ed Reyes has been a dedicated resident of Lindale Park for more than six decades. His deep roots in the community began when his parents moved to the neighborhood 64 years ago, when Ed was just six years old. In 1978, he purchased his first home in Lindale Park, further cementing his commitment to the area.

Ed's involvement in community affairs began in the late 1970s when he volunteered as a block captain, going door-to-door to connect with neighbors and discuss local concerns. This initial role sparked a lifelong journey of civic engagement and leadership. His dedication opened doors, leading him to serve as the first president of Super Neighborhood Council 51, an initiative launched by former Mayor Lee Brown.

Under Ed's leadership, the council secured a grant to build a playground at Moody Park—one of many tangible improvements he helped bring to the area.

He later was appointed by former Mayor Bill White to the Greater Northside Management District board of directors, where he continues to serve as secretary. Mayor White also appointed Ed as chairman of the Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone (TIRZ).

Ed has been an integral part of the Lindale Park Civic Club board of directors. He first joined the board in 1978, and over the years, he served multiple times as board president, leading efforts to foster community spirit and engagement.

One of his proudest initiatives is organizing the neighborhood's annual Fourth of July Parade, a tradition that has continued for 24 years (except for a pause during COVID-19). He also played a key role in bringing the METRORail through Lindale Park, enhancing mobility and access for residents.

Beyond his civic contributions, Ed is a proud and active member of St. Patrick Catholic Church where he serves as a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus and as a member of the church choir, the Altar Society and the Food Ministry. His faith and service go hand-in-hand, reinforcing his commitment to uplifting the community.



On November 11, Ed and Belinda Reyes will celebrate 30 years of marriage.

For 22 years, Ed volunteered with the Houston Thanksgiving Day Parade. In 2020, when the parade was canceled due to the pandemic, Ed and his wife, Belinda, were honored in a special feature on Channel 11, recognizing their many years of service.

Ed also has contributed to broader beautification efforts through Keep Houston Beautiful, working to enhance underserved areas of the city.

When asked what he would change about the neighborhood, Ed notes that while stricter deed restrictions could be helpful, he's proud to see Lindale Park remain a place where families continue to grow and thrive.

Through decades of service, Ed has helped shape Lindale Park into the vibrant, connected community it is today.



Member Spotlight *Meet Virginia Duke*

Virginia Duke's connection to the neighborhood spans generations, beginning in 1948 when her parents purchased a home at 313 Graceland St. Although her family left Houston for East Texas in 1950, Virginia returned in 1962, when her family bought a home at 818 Graceland St. She attended Davis High School, where she was an active band member.

In 1965, the family sold that home and moved just across the street to 903 Graceland St. Later, in 1973, Virginia relocated to the Greenspoint area before finally returning to Lindale Park in 1978, settling at 211 Eleanor St.

By the summer of 1979, crime in the area had begun to rise. Longtime neighbor Betty Davis organized a community meeting at Reid Memorial Church, which saw such an overwhelming turnout that it exceeded capacity. Inspired by the community's response, neighbors began block walking and organizing, which ultimately led to the formation of the Lindale Park Civic Club (LPCC).

Virginia quickly became active in the Civic Club and served as treasurer around 1981. That same year, she helped lead a major effort to re-establish expired deed restrictions, a challenging task that required going door to door across the neighborhood to collect signatures, despite having little to no funding.

One of Virginia's most significant efforts was helping to secure the noise abatement wall along Kelley Street. Along with three other residents, she personally knocked on every door on the north side of Kelley Street to gather the necessary signatures. Thanks to her persistence, the project moved forward.



Virginia also played a key role in the creation of the Scenic District, collecting signatures and earning the LPCC's full backing when presenting the proposal to city council.

Over the years, she has worked to protect the community from incompatible developments, such as when the Harris County Department of Education planned to use the lot at Kelley Street and Irvington Boulevard for school bus parking, then later as a record management facility and eventually as potential housing. Each time, Virginia helped rally the neighborhood to stop the projects.

For more than 25 years, she has been an outspoken opponent of the I-45 expansion, which she believes will negatively affect the community. Although the project is moving forward, she takes pride in the fact that her efforts have helped delay it for more than a decade.

Virginia's commitment extends beyond civic activism. She participated in the METRO Rail planning process and served as both chair of her local HPD Positive Interaction Program (PIP) and co-chair of the citywide monthly meetings, building relationships with law enforcement to address neighborhood issues.

As a past member of the Beautification Committee, the committee earned multiple awards for their work in making Irvington Boulevard one of Houston's most attractive neighborhoods.

"Although it's an inner-city neighborhood, we have enough protections, like our special minimum lot size, scenic district, and deed restrictions, to keep it truly community oriented," Virginia says, when asked what she loves most about Lindale Park.

Heavy Trash Delays Volunteers Stop the Pile Up

Yard waste and heavy trash pickup in Lindale Park used to be so predictable. On the first Friday of the month, neighbors could haul yard waste, tree clippings and heavy trash to the curb and watch as the giant claw cleared the streets of their debris.

Many neighbors looked forward to those “heavy trash Fridays” as a time to clean out attics and garages and discard unwanted items.

Nowadays, in Lindale Park and elsewhere in the Near Northside, both heavy trash and yard waste can sit on the streets for months at a time. It can feel like the aftermath of Hurricane Beryl. City budgets are crunched, and solid waste is experiencing lengthy delays.

Lindale Park resident Tom Reeves took it upon himself to address the serious problem of heavy trash in Lindale Park. His goal: To clear the streets by Halloween, so the kids can enjoy trick-or-treating safely.

“We are a destination for Halloween for the Near Northside, with more than 1,000 visitors, so we wanted to address this,” Tom says, who also volunteers as the Lindale Park Civic Club board treasurer.

Tom and other dedicated board members and volunteers walked the streets of Lindale Park, documenting the heavy trash overflows sitting on the curbs.

Tom personally filed 100 reports just from Kelley Street to English Street. “My goal for 100 reports was to make clear to the city the large-scale issue impacting this neighborhood,” he says.

Tom followed up with an email to Councilman Mario Castillo of District H with the 311 details.

Castillo’s office responded the next day, saying the city would perform a sweep of heavy trash for all of Lindale Park.

The LPCC appreciates the continued partnership with Councilman Castillo and are monitoring progress to ensure all streets are addressed.

The latest update on heavy trash pickup will be discussed at the October 28 Quarterly Meeting. In the meantime, residents are encouraged to continue reporting trash and other issues to 311 through the Houston 311 app or by calling 311.

“Lindale Park is such a proud neighborhood with significant civic engagement,” Tom says. “As a newer resident for four years, I want to continue that tradition.”

Street-to-Sofa Success Stories Helping Stray Dogs in Lindale Park

How many of our neighborhood dogs came from the streets of Lindale Park? If your four-legged friend once roamed the block before finding their “forever couch,” you’re not alone!

Since I moved here in 2019, I’ve helped a few pups find new families, several right here in our community — Paco, Woody, Farrah, Lady Grey, Dale and Willie Jack all started as strays and ended up with loving homes.

And, we still have Gracie, the chilliest husky mix in town, who is a pro lounge on her foster parent’s patio. She’d be a great companion for an older adult!

Lindale Park neighbors have shown that a little patience and teamwork go a long way when a lost or abandoned dog turns up. If you decide to help a stray, here are a few simple steps that make all the difference:

1. Stay safe first. Approach calmly and give the dog space — scared dogs can act unpredictably.
2. Contain and comfort. If possible, secure the dog in a fenced area with water and shade.
3. Check for identification. Look for tags or visit a vet or Love for Dogs to scan for a microchip.
4. Spread the word. Post photos on Nextdoor, Pawboost, or local “lost and found pets” groups.
5. Rehome responsibly. If no owner turns up, get basic vet care and connect with rescues or trusted neighbors to find a good match. Rescues are overburdened, so we’ve definitely had the best luck with “DIY” rehoming.

Shining the Spotlight on Local Businesses Wolfsmiths

Wolfsmiths is located at 201 Woodard St. on the northeast corner of Woodard and Fulton Streets. It's a new comfortable place for families to meet, have something to drink and relax. You don't have to ride a motorcycle to enjoy the atmosphere. (They break up the motorcycle scene by also having an old Volkswagen bus inside next to the stage.)

Wolfsmiths started as a motorcycle repair shop at 26th Street and Shepherd Drive in the Heights that included a small coffee shop, but it outgrew that location for anything but a cycle repair shop. (They still repair motorcycles there, but the coffee shop portion of the old location is now located at the Woodard and Fulton Streets location where part of the old tortilla factory used to be.)

They're open from 8 a.m. – 3 p.m. Tuesday-Wednesday; 8 a.m. – 11 p.m. Thursday-Saturday; 8 a.m. – 9 p.m. Sundays; and closed on Mondays.

They show a movie on Thursday nights. Fridays are Steak Nights with an open mic every other Friday for performers including comedians. On Sunday nights, they have live music.

Starting at 7 p.m. Thursday, October 30, they're having salsa dance lessons with a professional instructor starting with check-in at 6:30 p.m.

Having a full kitchen and cook, they'll be phasing in several food selections, including burgers and tacos soon.

Besides the two large sitting rooms downstairs, bar and patio, there's also a comfortable meeting room upstairs for up to 25 people that's free to use. Just book it in advance, so they can make sure the air conditioning is turned on.

Wolfsmiths is a neighborhood clublike venue and meeting place, and they are conveniently located. You can either walk or ride to Wolfsmiths or drive and park inside the fenced-in area or on the street. Feel free to check them out!
